Starting at the End

Life can be overwhelming, painful, and confrontational, offering impossible to avoid situations. When something unpleasant or inescapable happens along the journey, do this: start with the end. Imagine what it will be like for you after the present looming difficulty is over, after you are healed, after the trouble has passed (and it will). That vision at the end redefines any current trouble, struggles or fears. Of course, not all things turn out as we imagine and sometimes we are changed forever, but it is in this act of envisioning a better future coming toward us that makes it possible to slog through the present - bearing pain, taking on demons, discovering strength we never thought we had.

This mental strategy encouraged by psychologists today has ancient roots in the theological writings of Daniel, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and the Book of Revelations (to name a few). These writers envisioned a God who was constantly at work doing new things in the midst of terrible circumstances. The Israelite exile into Babylon in 587 BCE shattered a people of faith. What happens when you lose your king, your land, and your Temple – the symbol of God's covenantal presence with the people? God's love endures through all that mayhem and these prophetic voices creatively expressed the hopes of God both to make new lives of meaning in distant lands as well visioning the ultimate restoration of a New Jerusalem.

In the New Testament, the book of Revelation continues this hopeful theological imagination. This book becomes a word of needed hope to seven churches struggling with persecution from Imperial Rome. Despite all these hardships, John of Patmos urges these small churches to press on in their faith and acts of love despite the trouble they are experiencing. He shares an apocalyptic vision of God remaining present with them through the hell and death they knew all too well. Ultimately, this present, abiding God will bring them (and us) to a New Jerusalem, a new city of God where people and God dwell together in an intimate relationship. In fact, this new city has no temple, because there is no need - since God will reside directly with the people, not away in the temple. God starts us in a perfect garden and moves us to a holy city!

We, as the church, are to be the first fruits of this new city. Our interactions and love for one another and the stranger demonstrates this end reality, here and now. We as followers of Christ are a people who take comfort now,

I find myself worrying on how I will succeed or fail when I'm presenting a piece of music. No wiggle room allowed – I am either a success or a failure – all based on one performance. This mindset is, of course, incorrect and unhelpful. However, this focus of independent performance is pervasive in our culture (even if you are not pursuing a career in the professional music industry). Many of us wake up, work, eat, run through our days and occupy our time with a mindset of competitive anonymity from our fellow man. We judge ourselves and our peers by a pass/fail standard that can be very stressful. The ultimate questions of how will we succeed or fail as employees, friends, partners, parents, etc., can overwhelm. This isn't a healthy mindset. Christ said, "I came that they may have life and have it abundantly" (John 10:10). I don't know about you, but an abundant life, to me, is not one filled with a personal checklist of how I'm winning or losing in tasks that I must complete on my own each day.

This is why our time spent in music together as congregants is so powerful to me. We can consciously lay aside the negative ultimatums that we build into our minds and focus on One greater than we are, One whose love does not increase or wane depending on our performance. When we use our voices in praise and contemplation of the Divine, I find a measure of rest and fulfillment that only God and my community can give. Not only do multiple scientific studies show that group singing can have a positive effect on a person's mental health - lowering anxiety and promoting a better quality of life in the participants - we see repeated references in the Bible encouraging us to spend time together in this manner. Together we are bonded, encouraged, and uplifted: "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:16). As we go forward into the summer months at First Baptist, I hope that the community you find here will offer you the chance to rest and renew your minds each week. This is our call to one another. Let's lay aside our stresses and focus upward together.

Leading the children's program at First Baptist is such a blessing! It is my privilege to talk about Jesus and His love as we explore God's character throughout the Bible. We have begun building a model of Noah's Ark, and have learned that it was bigger than an airplane. Bee Buzz from the Blessed Bees Keeper!

The bee buzz for this Tall Spire is that our church bees will arrive at the end of May! Cornell's in Eastchester said it is because the bees need time in the spring to develop, the bee farm in Albany has recommended waiting a little longer to move them to their new homes. Unlike some bees that arrive in a package, our bees are going to be in two Nucs, and will arrive inside cardboard boxes with frames that already have stored honey and pollen, eggs and developing bees (brood), obtained from a strong hive. The queen will be clearly marked for us to track. The owner of Cornell's is a bee keeper and keeps hives on top of the store roof. Hopefully they will be Docile Bees and not Mean Bees, as you can get batches of either! Please pray for docile bees!

Nucs, or nucleus colonies, are small honey bee colonies created from larger colonies. The term refers to a smaller sized box and the colony of honeybees within it. The name is derived from the fact that a Nuc hive is centered on its queen, the nucleus of the honey bee colony. Ideally, they should contain 1/3 of a hive or 10,000-20,000 bees! We now have 2 assembled Bee Hives as well as the equipment needed and two bee suits. Carl Hamby and I joined the Hudson Valley Natural Beekeepers Club and attended our 1st meeting which was interesting and talked about animals that can invade your hives. Squirrels, Raccoons, Groundhogs and Wasps, Hornets and Ants all love honey. In the next few weeks we will be painting the hives and preparing the area for the Church Bees new home!

I also signed up for a Bee Keeping Course at Hilltop Hanover Farm and April 7th, I attended my first class. The first class was an overview of becoming a 'natural' beekeeper, which is highly recommended and the approach is different than commercial beekeeping. We have been assigned a Bee Keeping mentor for the Church Bees. Her name is Patricia Adams and she lives close by in Rye. She has 4 hives and has been Bee Keeping for many years and raises her own Queens. She has seen our property and the hives and made so many great recommendations as to the hive assembly and positioning on the property. Did you know the front door to the hive needs to face East? This way the bees wake up to the morning sun and get an early start to their day!

Carl and I plan to plant Bee friendly flowers this Spring in an area of the garden. The Bees love Sunflowers, Lavender, Clover, Dandelions, Hollyhocks, Calendula, Borage, Asters, Sweet Alyssum and Zinnias, just to name a few! All the plants in our community garden and orchard will benefit from our bee pollinators. We encourage donations of bee friendly packaged flower seeds! Please leave them under the office door.

I am pleased to report that, after many design revisions and upon obtaining approval from the White Plains Design Review Board, our new church signs have been installed on Bryant Avenue and on North Street. The new larger sign at the corner of Bryant Avenue and North Street incorporates our new church logo and brings increased visibility to First Baptist Church and our sister church Misión Bautista Hispaña de Westchester. It has space underneath to display banners highlighting special events such as our annual Egg Hunt.

The smaller North Street sign is also designed to allow replaceable special event signs to be displayed. Both signs will be lit at night with ground mounted spot lights equipped with dawn-to-dusk light sensors. With these new signs we hope to better communicate the presence of our dynamic congregations which seek engagement with the White Plains community.

New Orchard

Anyone who has spent time in Margaret's Garden will probably recall the dense brush pile that occupied the space between the garden and the slope up to the high school parking lot. After seeing this overgrown brush and weed patch for many years it occurred to me that it would be an ideal location for a fruit orchard to supplement the vegetables and other produce that we grow in Margaret's Garden. With many thanks to the Church Board and Property Team who gave the green-light to have the brush pile cleared and with the advice of Doug Candia, a local "urban food forest" expert, I have begun selecting plants and mapping out a design for the new orchard.

We've started with plantings of disease-resistant varieties of plum and apple trees that are well adapted to the Northeast and trees which produce nutritious but highly perishable fruits such as paw paws and persimmons that are generally not available (at least not fully ripe) in grocery stores. Semi-dwarf apple trees were chosen whose fruit can be picked while standing on the ground. The first three varieties planted include the Liberty, a good allpurpose eating and baking apple; the Jonagold, a delicious cross of Jonathan and Golden Delicious apples; and the Chestnut Crabapple, an excellent pollinator for other apple varieties that is also edible. In addition two crosspollinating plum tree varieties good for fresh eating and making jelly were planted as were two elderberry varieties whose dark purple berries can be juiced to make a sauce with reputed medicinal properties.

The plants are young so it will take between 2 to 4 years for them to come into production but being planted this young they should develop into hardy, long-lived trees that will produce fruit for many years to come. There is room in the orchard plot for more trees so I am seeking input from all who have in interest about trees and plants that you'd like to see included. Many thanks to Ken Shortlidge, Joe Mariotta, and David Pereira, a High School volunteer from Iona Prep, who helped do the initial planting.
