This was received with sadness by some in the church, but we knew that it was what had to be done because they had become a danger. Several were dead and the others diseased. One of the trees produced only dry dust as the workers ground it up, yes, it was dead.

Although this has certainly transformed the landscape of our campus, it reminds me of where many churches find themselves facing in the 21st century. The "beautiful trees" of Christendom are diseased and dying. In order to have relevant, authentic relationships where even enemies are loved, the structures of "church as it has been" that do not enhance these values of Christ must be cut down. After all, they're dangerous!

The first Sunday after the huge copper beech just to the east of the sanctuary came down, the amount of light that came into the sanctuary was amazing! The challenge and opportunity for the churches today is create spaces that "let the light in." People are looking for a safe space where they can discover who God has made them to be. For far too long, the institutional church has been throwing shade on people's lives instead of letting the light in. This is a reminder that it's okay to miss the trees, but God's call to us is to be enablers of light.

flourishing. In addition to plantings of corn, beans, zucchini, and other vegetables that we sell to help support the Center of Hope (Haiti), we now have space to grow fruits and vegetables for our Putting Families First food cooperative, which will be launched this Fall.

New Church Signage

AFTER A LONG PROCESS involving several iterations we have arrived at a final design for a new, larger sign to replace the old, outdated sign at the corner of Bryant Avenue and North Street.

It will incorporate our new church logo and display the new contemporary logo of American Baptist Churches next to the name of our partner in service to the Spanish speaking community, Misión Bautista Hispana de Westchester. The sign will be located closer to the corner property lines for better visibility and lit at night from ground-mounted spotlights. There will be space below the sign to display banners for special events. The two side signs on North Street and Bryant Avenue will be replaced with 3'x4' signs of similar design that display the names and service times for each congregation. We wish to signal with the installation of these signs a new, invigorated religious presence in the White Plains community.
