#### MARGARET'S GARDEN

While the winter was challenging for our bees the spring has been good for Margaret's Garden and the orchard. The peas that were planted after St. Patty's Day have benefited from the cool weather this spring are up and thriving. It looks like we will have a bountiful harvest of sweet Sugar Snap peas in early June. The children's Sunday School class planted cucumbers, egg plants, and zucchini seeds which were started in the Wilson House Sunroom and moved to the greenhouse along with tomato and beet seedlings. Work is in progress to establish a new raised bed for strawberries. In the meantime the everbearing variety planted last year has bloomed and is loaded with what appears to be a promising yield of strawberries. For those who love strawberry rhubarb pie, three rhubarb plants have been planted in a bed adjacent to the asparagus bed and should be ready to start harvesting next spring.

All of our orchard trees survived the winter including the new peach and paw paw trees and bee-friendly aronia (chokeberry) bushes that were planted last fall. The straw bales that were used over the winter as windbreaks for the beehives are being recycled as mulch to keep the weeds down in the garden and orchard. We thank all those who came out on Planting Day on Saturday, May 18th and helped transplant tomato, cucumber, and zucchini seedlings and plant corn and beans. We will transplant our greenhouse seedlings and plant seeds for sweet corn and green beans. With help from the bees and good spring weather we look forward to a bountiful yield from Margaret's Garden this year!

#### THE BLESSED BEES

It has been a challenging winter for Beekeeping. Carl and I (Lucia Gold) did all we could do to save our bees by putting bales of hay around the hives, adding insulation to the boxes and later foam board. But alas, this spring, upon doing an inspection, it was discovered that only the yellow hive survived! Initially we though that both hives were thriving because we saw bee activity going in and out. Upon opening up the blue hive we discovered that more

than likely bees from the yellow hive were stealing honey and invading the blue hive. Much to our disappointment, the entire blue hive was dead. It was shocking and difficult to watch as Carl brushed hundreds of dead bees from the bottom of the hive onto the ground!

We are encouraged that at least the yellow hive survived. The blue hive was the weaker of the two, so in some ways we were not too surprised. Carl and I are not giving up and we immediately purchased a new package of bees, which included a new queen. Carl and Jay (my husband) took a ride up to Kingston, NY to Hudson Valley Bee Supply and brought the 'girls' home to their new hive. The queen comes in a little box and the box has something like cotton candy on the end. The idea is that the bees will eat the candy to release the queen and they begin mating and making brood. Within a few days she was released from the box but after two weeks we saw no brood which means they rejected their queen and either declared mutiny and killed her or pushed her out of the hive in total dismissal. Fortunately, Hudson Valley Bee Supply indicated that because our queen left her hive we are entitled to another queen, free of charge! Jay picked her up and Carl put her into the hive, and this time things went as planned. The bees released her and hopefully will like her. To encourage them to mate we transferred some of the brood from the yellow hive over to the blue hive. We are still in the process of determining if this hive will thrive.



In the meantime Patricia Adams, our bee mentor, has introduced us to new beekeepers in White Plains. Patricia will be mentoring them as well and we can all learn from each other which will be exciting and fun. Again, Carl Hamby deserves much of the credit since I have been recovering from my surgery. I'm not quite sure what I would do without him! He certainly is a blessing to me and is always willing and able. Thanks again, Carl, for all of your help.
